As many of you know, on January 23, 2019 our Manitoba government announced a new Commission on Kindergarten to Grade 12 Education with nine commissioners to guide this Comprehensive Independent Review of Manitoba's Education System. Most of you from other provincial and territorial jurisdictions have already experienced a similar kind of government response to education, often culminating in a wide array of changes to the structure of your education system.

The website at <https://www.edu.gov.mb.ca/educationreview/index.html>, outlines the Context, Mandate, Focus Areas, and how organizations and individuals can participate. A final report is to be delivered to the Minister of Education by February 2020 with findings and recommendations to be shared with Manitobans in March 2020.

Recently it was announced that Avis Glaze has been hired as the lead consultant for the commission; this is the same consultant who recently prompted Nova Scotia to eliminate elected school boards along with other sweeping changes. The question that many are asking, "Is this a real conversation about education with boundless possibilities or . . . ?" Only time will tell.

My hope is that we can have open dialogue and conversation about our purpose for education. Simon Sinek, in his book entitled, *Start With Why*, suggests that if we as human beings don't know the "why," we can't know the "how." If this commission only focuses on the "how" of education, without understanding the "why" of education, I fear





The Canadian Association of School System Administrators (CASSA) has included improving student and staff mental health and well-being as one of its priorities and has joined four other organizations who share a commitment to healthy school communities as stewards in the Canadian Alliance for Healthy School Communities. The Alliance is a collaboration of stakeholders spanning the interests of both **health** and **education** working together to advance healthy school communities through a comprehensive school health approach. Our vision is “Every school in Canada is a healthy school community.” The four other stewardship organizations are DASH BC, EverActive Schools – Alberta, Ophea – Ontario and PHE Canada. I’ll update you on the Alliance as we progress.

Since my last update, I have been to the National Conference for the School Superintendents Association; this group represents our colleagues in the United States. Their conference is very large in scale as there are so many more

superintendents in the United States than here in Canada. In fact, the average size of a school district in the U.S. is about 3,300 students. There were several speakers and workshops focussing on the importance of strong system leadership to help improve student achievement.

The 2018 recipient is David Keohane, Superintendent of Greater St. Albert Catholic Schools. David was recognized by his American colleagues during the

saying, “His vision and support has been and continues to be critical to the leadership team and the Indigenous education team in supporting Indigenous students and promoting reconciliation.”

At that same November welcoming ceremony, Christian made the following statement: “I am humbled by the Board’s confidence in my leadership. I’ve been a part of LRSD for many years, and I am honoured to continue this journey of serving the community. Together with LRSD’s larger network of leaders and administrators, we will continue to place the best interests of students at the forefront of everything we do. We are all leaders and followers, and I look forward to learning from my colleagues, students, parents and the wider community as we educate and inspire our students on their learning journey.”

Christian’s leadership style is based on placing the utmost importance on relationships and collaboration, believing that a leader should always promote and support teamwork.

His educational philosophy is based on the concept that students learn best and teachers improve their practice most when everyone is actively engaged in the learning process. Parents and the community, for example, are also partners in education, and students and teachers all thrive in an environment that is built on security, caring, belonging and respect. His philosophy also includes the idea that teachers must learn together, inquire together and solve problems together to fully realize their potential as educators. ○

Christian lives in Winnipeg with his two daughters, Émilie and Camille, as well as Sammy, their Springer Spaniel.

Christian Michalik is the new Superintendent of the Louis Riel School Division (LRSD) in Winnipeg, Manitoba. He took on this leadership position at the beginning of January 2019. This isn’t an entirely new role for Christian, however, as he had been the Acting Superintendent for the division since December 2017.

Throughout his career, Christian has been a strong advocate for both the French Immersion program and French-language instruction in English schools. His journey in public education began in the fall of 1989 when he was hired as a middle years teacher at École Golden Gate School (now known as Golden Gate Middle School) in the St. James-Assiniboia School Division in western Winnipeg. A decade later, he was named principal at Collège Jeanne-Sauvé, a position he held until 2005.

In 2005, Christian first joined the Louis Riel School Division when he accepted the position as a Director of School & Community Support. Louis Riel School Division includes 40 schools with over


15,500 students in the southeast quadrant of Winnipeg.

One year later, Christian was named an Assistant Superintendent for the division. He remained at that position until 2017, when he took on the Acting Superintendent role.

In addition to advocating for the French language, Christian has also worked to support reconciliation and the integration of Indigenous perspectives in Canadian schools. His efforts were recently recognized during a ceremony held in November 2018 when he was welcomed as the new Superintendent for LRSD. Two LRSD colleagues, Corey Kapilik, Indigenous Education Coordinator, and Shirley Ewanchuk, Indigenous Language Consultant, presented Christian with an eagle feather. The eagle feather is the highest recognition that can be given in Anishinaabe culture. The Louis Riel School Division is situated on Treaty One Territory, the traditional lands of the Anishinaabe and the homeland of the Red River Métis.

At the time, Corey commented on the role that Christian’s leadership has played in furthering Indigenous education and opportunities for all students in the division,

His research focuses on narratives of physical education, school sport, physical literacy praxis, meaningful physical education and teacher education.

His life-course journey has allowed him to work with a variety of people and organizations across the country and around the world. At this time, Dr. Gleddie is researching narratives of movement and physical education, school sport, and the affective and implementation aspects of physical literacy.

Good Spirit School Division Sea Stars

The leadership team at the Good Spirit School Division in Saskatchewan has embraced the values taught in this fable. Its Sea Stars employee recognition awards program is based on those values, while also incorporating the division's own motto: Students Come First. It's a positive initiative that lets the board and senior administration team highlight the acts of kindness and extra special personal touch for students that so many employees work to deliver every day.

Sea Stars stands for Sparkling Examples of Accomplished Skillful Talented And Radiant Staff. The awards program, initiated in 2011, offers a formal way to recognize Good Spirit School Division employees who embody the division's foundational values:

- Belonging;
- Respect;
- Responsibility;
- Learning;
- Nurturing; and
- Perseverance.

The nominations committee considers an additional three areas when determining who should be recognized:

1. High level of achievement;
2. Individual or school team making a marked difference; and
3. Dedicated service.

Nominations are accepted each year until the end of October, and awards are presented shortly after.

All division employees are eligible to receive this award. To illustrate this point, consider that in 2018, employees recognized with a Sea Star award included a library technician, members of a walking school bus team, school counsellors, a school administrative assistant, educational assistants, and more.

In 2017, all 33 staff members of an entire school—Victoria School in the community of Kamsack—were among the annual award recipients. At the time the award was presented, Mark Forsythe, one of the

The Good Spirit School Division serves about 6,000 students in 27 schools in east central Saskatchewan. Much of the division is located in rural communities; it also includes several large towns and the cities of Melville and Yorkton. Good Spirit School Division spans a geographic area from Esterhazy in the south, Preeceville in the north, Calder in the east and Springside

in the west. Six First Nation communities are within the division's boundaries. The school division also serves two Hutterite-based schools. Its administration office is in Yorkton.

The division's Director of Education is Quintin M. Robertson. Donna Kriger is its Deputy Director of Education Services and its Superintendents of Education include Mark Forsythe, Lisa Wotherspoon and Alisa Leidl.


Note: Starfish and sea stars are the same creature, with "starfish" being the more common name.

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
