

CASSA EXL Award: 2016 Nominees

Each year, CASSA honours the EXL Award recipient at our summer conference. The ceremony for the 2016 award will take place on Thursday, July 7, in Winnipeg. The recipient is chosen from a selection of high-calibre nominees from across the country, representing a number of CASSA's regional affiliates. This national recipient will also go on to represent CASSA as the Canadian Superintendent of the Year at the annual American School Superintendents Association conference in February 2017.

The 2016 nominees include individuals from the Northwest Territories Superintendents Association (NWTSA), the Association of Directors General of English School Boards of Quebec (ADGESBQ), the Ontario Catholic Supervisory Officers' Association (OCSOA) and the College of Alberta School Superintendents (CASS).

Denise McDonald

NWTSA

Denise is the Superintendent and Chief Executive Officer for the Beaufort Delta Divisional Educational Council (BDEC) and the nominee for the Northwest Territories Superintendents Association.

She has also served as BDEC's Assistant Superintendent, the Health and Wellness Manager for the Gwich'in Tribal Council, a teacher at Samuel Hearne Secondary School, the Aboriginal Languages and Culture Based Education Coordinator in Yellowknife, and an administrator and teacher at Joseph Burr Tyrell Elementary School in Fort Smith.

Denise is known for her keen desire and success in developing partnerships and effective working relations within and between organizations. She is often sought after and has held many significant leadership roles.

Some of the many groups in which she has been a member include the Government of the Northwest Territories Anti-Poverty Advisory Group, Aurora College Board of Governors, Aboriginal Sports Circle of the Western Arctic, Inuvik Emergency Shelter Committee, Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples roundtable discussions on Education, Children's First

Fundraising Committee, Inuvik Family Counselling Committee and the NWT Teacher Education Evaluation Committee.

In Denise's current role, her work in uniting the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation and Gwich'in Tribal Council's support to develop local curriculums that reflect that culture, context and history of the population BDEC serves has been an integral piece to improving student achievement.

Curtis Brown, Superintendent of the South Slave Divisional Education Council, says, "Denise is not only respected for her Aboriginal heritage and breadth of educational leadership knowledge, her eloquence and passion for the health and well-being of northern children and their families is always front and centre. Gail is a senior administrator with the Riverside School Board on the south shore of Montreal and the nominee for the Association of Directors General of

English School Boards of Quebec. Her career in Quebec administration spans 37 years. Her professional experiences have been varied; she taught at the elementary and high school levels before moving to educational administration.

Throughout Gail's career, she has been a champion for students who struggle academically and socially. She taught special education to students with special needs and was also a teacher of incarcerated youth. She worked as a school administrator in alternative schools that serviced at-risk students and was an elementary school principal in a low socioeconomic area.

From 2007 to 2016, she was the Director of Complementary Educational Services at the Riverside School Board. In this role, she oversaw special education services and learning support programs for the school board.

The common thread that weaves all of these experiences together is Gail's belief that youth who are at risk deserve support and her passion to make a difference as an educator.

In the latter phases of her career, Gail developed a keen interest in applied educational research. She has been instrumental in developing and researching a sleep hygiene program for elementary students. This program, Sleep for Success, has been successfully implemented in schools within the Riverside School Board.

Throughout her career, Gail has been an active member on various provincial committees. For many years, she was the Vice-Chair on the provincial committee of Administrators of Complementary Educational Services (ACES). She also served on the Steering Committee of the Leadership Committee for

English Education in Quebec (LCEEQ), a provincial pedagogical think tank. Over the years, she has also served on various committees in service to the Ministry of Education.
