Message From The Editor: Learning In Newfoundland and Labrador

his July, participants at the CASA Summer Leadership Academy witnessed the deep love that Newfoundlanders and Labradorians have for their home. The conference was held in downtown St. John's, but thanks to the stories told and chances to explore outside the city, folks from "away" left with an appreciation for the vast geography, rich cultures, and warmth and beauty of the people.

We listened to educators still working in the province during challenging restructures and to those who have found work elsewhere across Canada. We watched and listened to young dancers and musicians as they shared with us their heritage. We spoke with fishermen, shopkeepers, tour guides, and ordinary men and women we met on city streets and country roads. In each of these encounters, we all

stood to learn something new about this lovely part of our country, and about ourselves.

After a session featuring expatriate Newfoundlanders talking about their experiences leaving to work elsewhere in Canada, outgoing CASA president **Ruth Mattingley** said something that stuck with me throughout the conference. She was speaking about the gifts these expats

bring to their new students across the country. I believe, though, her sentiment applies to us all if we consider Newfoundlanders to be teachers and the visitors to be students in our encounters this summer.

"They brought their humour and spirit with them," she said, "and students are richer for it."

A Brief Summary Of The Sessions

elegates to the 2005
CASA Summer Leadership Academy were welcomed to the conference,
the city of St. John's and the province of Newfoundland and Labrador
by outgoing CASA president Ruth
Mattingley, St. John's mayor Andy
Wells, NLSBA executive director
Brian Shortall and NLADE vice
president Claudine Wells. "I hope
you have a 'whale' of a time," Wells
noted.

The first morning, Thursday, July 14, was dedicated to the theme of restructuring. Newfoundland's deputy minister of education Bruce Hollett presented the government's perspective on the recent amalgamation of 11 boards to 5. The boards' perspectives were delivered by **Dr. Darren** King, Cynthia Fleet and Dr. Ross Elliot, who said, "Consolidation is by no means done. Its success will depend on the continued commitment by all parties." Representatives from New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario, Alberta and Newfoundland then led round table discussions.

That afternoon, a panel of former NLADE members who had left the province to work elsewhere in Canada each took the microphone to explain their decisions and describe their experiences thus far.

"The degree to which losing my buddies—not just a 'network'—was devastating," reported **Peter Gamwell**, now in Ottawa. "But children are children wherever you go." While **Greg Penney**, now in northern Manitoba, also acknowledged the difficulty of leaving ties behind, he said he was grateful for the opportunity to see another side of education in a different province. **Roger Nippard**, now in northeastern Alberta, found his move "invigorating and intimidating; I went from knowing everyone in Newfoundland to no one in Alberta, but that's changed... My retirement will be richer for having worked in both jurisdictions." Roger Clark, now in northern Alberta, said that while it's been hard to be far from family, the positives now outweigh any negatives.



Saturday featured three inspiring "Snapshots of Success" sessions, featuring stories from across the country.

The day closed with a session led by **Phyllis Reardon** of REDAS (Regional Economic Development and Schools); she was joined by program participants **Jody Hale** and **Samantha Abbott**.

Friday's sessions started with a discussion about provincial/territorial testing programs and curriculum development/support, led by CASA's regional directors. Another set of round table discussions was held, this time focusing on ideas for a paper that CASA may deliver to the Council of Ministers of Education.

The next session featured a panel of

school board trustees and CEOs sharing thoughts on how to balance politics and relationships with the political masters.

Maurice Barry closed the day with a talk on how colleagues in Newfoundland have had to become leaders in developing distance education programs and methodologies. The conference's final speaker, **Dr. Edwina Wetzel**, shared an inspiring story of how, through hard work and dedication, the First Nations community of Conne River, Newfoundland, regained control of its students' education. The positive changes she described in the school and community over the last 20 years (including a resurgence in the Mi'kmaq language) could not help but impress delegates in attendance. "Are we a success? I think we are," she declared.
