
We who worked in school districts identified the impacts of change, the political desire to form learning in new ways, the move to centralization of administration and curriculum, and the major call for reporting and accountability.



## Rose Vetere, School Social Worker: Recognition For An Important Advocate For Children

It takes a team of many individuals working together within an individual school board to address issues of children's mental health. The team can include, among others, classroom teachers, teaching assistants, trustees, committee members, parents, principals, senior administrators, public health workers and school social workers.

This past October, school social worker **Rose Vetere** received the School Social Work Achievement Award at the Annual Ontario Association of Social Workers Symposium. This award is presented each year to just one social worker in the entire province.

Rose works for the Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board. The Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board is the successor to the Dufferin-Peel Roman Catholic Separate School Board, which was established in 1969 by the merger of eight small separate boards. The board's jurisdiction extends throughout the municipalities of Mississauga, Brampton, Bolton, Caledon, Orangeville and Dufferin County. Dufferin-Peel is one of the largest and fastest growing school boards in Ontario.

Leaders & Learners congratulates Rose for her achievement and commends her for her part in improving children's mental health. She and her colleagues are important advocates for school children and their families.

he 2010 School Social Work Achievement Award was presented to Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board school social worker **Rose Vetere** at the end of October. This award recognizes a school social worker "who exemplifies the everyday successes in their career through outstanding accomplishments and who exudes caring, dependable, enthusiastic, helpful, resourceful and knowledgeable characteristics."

Rose works at Mississauga's St. Francis Xavier S. S., St. David of Wales and San Lorenzo Ruiz schools on a rotating basis. Since joining the Dufferin-Peel board in 2000, she has served at eight additional schools across the board.

She has a deep understanding of system alignment. As a school social worker, she continues to be respected by those with whom she works. Supervisory officers, school administrators, teachers and support staff are supportive of and supported by Rose's practice.

"Rose's clinical and caseworker skills are clearly in the superior range," says **Patricia Codner**, acting chief social worker for the Dufferin-Peel board. "She is a staunch advocate for students and families, a tactical dismantler of systemic barriers in education and a master referral agent."

Rose is also praised for her persevering and innovative style. **Patricia Nichols**, principal of St. David of Wales school, can always count on her to unravel layers of snowballed problems to help children and families succeed.




Santa Claus North Pole

a family receive an entire home makeover by the Oakvillebased organization Walls of Hope, despite the fact that the Mississauga family did not originally meet the qualifications due to their location in Peel.

In 2005, Rose was working with another family in significant need with few resources. She posted an ad on the board's intranet, which resulted in an overwhelming number of donations from school board staff. This act pioneered the development of the Dufferin-Peel Donations Unlimited program. This is an internal donation system that connects school staff with families in need to the attention of over 10,000 board employees who can donate the necessary items. Volunteer board drivers pick up and drop off the resources directly to the families in a dignified way.

"Social work is the profession I have chosen, but it is also my vocation," says Rose. "I have a real passion for what I do—advocating for children and families, finding resources and navigating through obstacles to achieve change. There isn't a one-size-fits-all answer for the children and families

with whom I work. It's my responsibility as a social worker to find creative solutions to each unique situation."

In addition to her work in the schools, Rose sits on numerous committees, including ones for safe schools and antibullying. She is proactive in the social work field, writing articles for regional and American publications, as well as working with colleagues to design more consistent standards of professional social work practices.

"Much of what social workers do is behind the scenes," says Rose. "Our work is confidential and as a result, we often don't receive or expect acknowledgement for our interventions. I was absolutely shocked when I received the call about the award. It's extremely humbling to receive such an extraordinary acknowledgement."

The Ontario Association of Social Workers is a voluntary, non-profit, bilingual association for social workers with over 3,900 members and 15 branches across Ontario.
