Chris Gonnet, 1955–2011: Remembering A Leader, An Educator And A Friend

n January 10, 2011, CASA lost a leader, an educator and a friend when **Chris Gonnet** passed away. Chris was CASA's president-elect and treasurer, and was set to take on the role of president in July 2011. Chris was also deeply involved in the work of the College of Alberta School Superintendents (CASS) and served as zone 1 director for that organization.

Chris was superintendent of schools for the Grande Prairie Public School District since August 2006. From January 1997 to July 2006, he was the regional superintendent of schools for the Yukon Department of Education, Public Schools Branch, in Whitehorse. His career in his beloved Yukon, however, goes back further than this. Chris was the principal at Riverdale Junior Secondary School from September 1992 to December 1996, with a seven-month secondment to the Yukon Department of Education in 1996 as grade reorganization coordinator for Whitehorse schools.

His administration career started in Alberta, first as assistant principal at Wildwood School in Wildwood (1983–84), then as principal at Dr. Folkins Community School in Chauvin (1987–88) and principal at Wainwright High School in Wainwright (1988–1992). Chris was also a teacher and a sports coach.

Chris's formal education included a Master's of Education in Educational Administration(1991), a Bachelor of Education after-degree (1979), and a Bachelor of Physical Education (1977), all earned at the University of Alberta. Chris graduated from Onoway High School in 1973 with an advanced high school diploma.

Chris was the 2005 recipient of the CASA EXL Award. Chris's other awards include receiving the Excellence in Education Award in recognition of his leadership and initiatives undertaken to advance information technology at Riverdale School and in the Yukon, and the Rotary International Paul Harris Fellowship for his volunteer service supporting Rotary's local community and international humanitarian service projects.

His professional contributions are almost too numerous to list. The many organizations besides CASA and CASS that have benefited from Chris's energy and ideas include the Public School Boards Association of Alberta, Alberta School Boards Association, Western and Northern Canadian Curriculum Consortium, Canadian School Net Advisory Board, Zenger Miller Organization and Leadership Training Program, Connect Yukon Project, Yukon Department of Education EduNet Project, Canadian Association of Principals, Association of Yukon School Administrators, Alberta Teachers' Association Yellowhead Local, various Yukon education committees, and Rotary International.

Deepest sympathies go out to Chris's wife of 32 years, **Gloria Gonnet**; their two grown children, **Dr. Jennifer Gonnet** and **Brennan Gonnet**; and his extended family, his friends and his colleagues.

"I had the honour of dining with Chris the Wednesday evening before he passed away. We were both in Leduc to attend the College of Alberta School Superintendents board meeting for Thursday and Friday. As was the way with Chris, we had great conversation during our meal. We talked about wine, travel, Whitehorse, his children, the Edge Hockey Academy, politics of Alberta. I have always admired the relationship Chris and Gloria had and his love and pride about his children. He always gave me updates about his kids and spoke so supportively of Gloria and her work in Grande Prairie.



At the meeting the next day he was his usual self, friendly, ebullient, representing CASS well with the deputy minister and his executive team when they visited. He lunched with us on Friday and left to meet his son. Monday he was on a VC conference with Jim Brandon's group. That evening was his last. He was there in CASS right until the end.

I will miss Chris. He became a good friend. I thought those of us who were together in and since Whitehorse would travel more together as we retired and our lives slowed down a bit. We need to know that each day is a gift."

He was looking forward to becoming the president of CASA.

It was the collegiality and friendship that the three of us had that made work enjoyable. Together we believed that if we would work together yet respect one another's differences, we would improve the educational system in the Peace Country. So we

met, we phoned, we casually dropped by, we shared, we laughed, we imagined, we challenged one another, and sometimes just chatted and debriefed. But time was one of the biggest challenges for us all.

So one of us, I don't even remember who, conceived the 7am breakfast at Denny's idea. Chris would show up first, and either Sheldon or I would roll in just on time or a few minutes late. Chris often repeated a line I once used: 'I am sure that your time is far more valuable than mine.' And we would all smile and laugh. Chris's personality and wit made

n mine.' And we ity and wit made the early mornings enjoyable. We used the Denny's meetings and other meetings to discuss many different things, from ideas to improve schools to building com-

munity partnerships, to share research, to challenge and question one another's strategies and positions. And at times we met to reconcile our differences. Although we didn't always agree, we believed it was important to work together. Chris often was the bridge builder for many issues. We joked a lot, we poked fun at one another and we enjoyed one another's friendship.

What I admire most about Chris is that he believed in what he said. He had a strong vision and would ask, 'Is this in the best interest of all students, and will it help us improve?' He was passionate about making a difference and his remarkable vision became Grande Prairie Public's vision. Chris was passionate about student success in Grande Prairie Public, but he also had a passion for success at the regional, provincial and national level.

Chris also spoke passionately about the times he and his son Brennan had together. He said the times that he spent with his family were the best times of his life and he told many stories about those times. They were his fondest moments.

To Brennan, Jen and Gloria, we miss him as much as you do but we promise to champion the things that he believed in. We will be the warm and welcoming hosts that Chris always was. We will continue to work hard together to improve. Chris's legacy is who he is and what he did. His good works here on Earth are lessons for all of us."

Report On The American Association Of School Administrators 2011 National Conference On Education

obert Mills, CASA's Quebec regional director, and I attended the American Association of School Administrators 2011 National Conference on Education's governance-related meetings in Denver, Colorado, on Tuesday, February 15, and Wednesday, February 16.

As a result of the meetings, a recommendation for a new mission statement for the AASA was being proposed as

"The American Association of School Administrators advocates for the highest quality public education for all students, and develops and supports school system leaders."

The highlight of the meeting was

US Secretary of Education **Arne Duncan** sharing an update with educational leaders about current issues in American education.

On Thursday, February 17, **John Mackle**, director of education for the Peterborough Victoria Northumberland and Clarington Catholic District School Board, received the Superintendent of the Year Award for Canada.

Michael Fullan was the keynote speaker following the award presentation on "Motion Leadership: How to Make All Systems Go" and was well received by delegates. The AASA attracted 1,400 participants for this year's conference.
