### 2014 Conference in Calgary: Engaging Students, Making a Difference

THIS YEAR'S CASSA conference in Calgary promises to be the biggest we've ever had. That's thanks in part to members registering in record numbers. The support from sponsoring partners, such as Imagine Learning and Maximus, and Alberta Education have helped make the conference a must-attend event for Canadian school system leaders.

You'll find details of our familyfriendly tours starting on page 6.

Pre-conference activities start on Thursday, July 3, and include the 9am CASSA AGM (all delegates welcome), a series of meetings between the College of Alberta School Superintendents (CASS) and Alberta Education at 12:30pm (CASS members and Alberta Education staff eligible to attend), and Leading People to Success, a free coaching workshop based on The Change Place programs at 1pm.

Conference activities start at 5:30pm, with a no-host bar. At 6pm, CASSA president **Roger Nippard** hosts a welcome and recognition of guests and sponsors; CASS president **Karl Germann**, AASA presidentelect **David Pennington** and others will also speak.

At 6:25pm, the Alberta Minister of Education, the Honourable **Jeff Johnson**, will speak on "Inspiring Education." He was elected to his first term as a Member of the



Calgary, host city to the 2014 CASSA conference.

Legislative Assembly for the riding of Athabasca-Sturgeon-Redwater in March 2008. He was appointed Minister of Education in May 2012. He is also the 2012-14 Council of Ministers of Education chair.

The evening will also include the 2014 CASSA Awards, sponsored by Xerox. The awards presentation will start at 7:15pm. They include the CASSA Honorary Life Membership Award and the Xerox EXL Awards. **Randy Brydges**, director of Xerox-Western Canada Operations, **Kristen Keating**, strategic account manager with Xerox, and **Linda Lucas**, president of ELLE & Associates, will present these awards.

At 8pm, **Dr. Doug Willms** will present the opening keynote address called "Student Engagement, Learning and Mental Health in Canadian Schools." *Tell Them From Me* is a dynamic web-based evaluation that lets students take part in their school's evaluation in a non-threatening way. In this presentation, Dr. Willms will summarize the Canadian findings with an emphasis on the equality of outcomes among social class groups and between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students, and discuss the extent to which these subpopulations have access to the classroom and school factors that affect schooling outcomes. The

findings have implications for policy and practice at the classroom, school, district and provincial levels.

Dr. Willms is the president of KSI Research International Inc. and The Learning Bar Inc., professor and director of the Canadian Research Institute for Social Policy at the University of New Brunswick, and holds the Canada Research Chair in Literacy and Human Development. He is a Member of the US National Academy of Education, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and a Fellow of the International Academy of Education.

At 9pm, everyone is invited to the CASSA reception sponsored by CASS and Alberta Education. This event includes a no-host cash bar, a variety of hot and cold hors d'oeuvres, veggies and tasty Alberta roast beef on a bun.
