# Message from the President: Wellness in the School System

As WINTER SETS in and the holidays approach, our thoughts often turn to wellness, both for our staff and our students. Media reports abound with statistics about the need to attend to matters of physical and mental health, the lack of services, particularly for youth, and the dire long-term

consequences when physical and mental problems are left untreated.

For example, the Canadian Mental Health Association estimates that one in five people will experience a mental health problem in their lifetime (www.cmha.ca).

According to the Mental Health Commission of Canada (MHCC), more than two thirds of young adults facing a mental health problem report that their symptoms first appeared in childhood, signalling an urgent need for increased prevention and early intervention.

Yet data show that most children do not receive any intervention for their mental health problems.

Increasingly, we are aware of the interplay between wellness and learning. When students struggle with mental health problems, we know that the impact on their academic progress and social well-being is significant. Thus it is no surprise that educators have started to focus attention on

this important issue of student mental health.

The news, however, is not all negative. Mental health problems and disorders can be successfully treated and managed, the earlier the better. Schools have long been recognized as a setting conducive to large-scale prevention and targeted intervention. Initiatives can be successfully implemented to address the social-emotional well-being of students.

health. CASSA was also an active member of the School-Based Mental Health and Substance Abuse consortium, a 40-member team of researchers, practitioners and educators working under the auspices of the MHCC. In 2013, this group issued a report on the state of school-based mental health in Canada with five recommendations for further action.

In 2015, the CASSA board of directors identified that further work needs to be done in this area and began sharing resources from our respective provinces

and territories. In February 2016, the board of directors will meet for a two-day strategic planning meeting in Toronto, and this topic will be a major feature of our discussions.

One of the advantages of a national organization such as ours is the potential for influencing change on a systemic level; it is our desire to harness that potential and make a meaningful impact that will benefit the well-being of all students, particularly those who are most vulnerable. It will be exciting to share our work in this area with you in the coming months.

# What are the most positive developments you saw in 2015 in your regional organization?

A highlight of 2015 for the Ontario Catholic Supervisory Officers' Association (OCSOA) was our AGM at the Royal York Hotel in Toronto from April 15 to 17. Attendance was the highest ever and a central celebration at the banquet was the recognition of former Ontario

Premier **William Davis** as an Honourary Member of OCSOA. In 1984, then-Premier Davis courageously announced the intent to extend full funding to grades 11, 12 and 13 (OAC) in Catholic schools.

OCSOA's Mentor-Coaching Program for newly appointed supervisory officers and directors of education continues to support our new members as they transition into their new roles. A side benefit to this program is the relationships developed between the mentee and the active mentor as well as the learning about other school boards.

### What were the biggest challenges your regional organization faced in 2015?

The biggest challenge for our OCSOA supervisory officers in 2015 was the negotiation of multiple collective bargaining agreements for this fall. The accompanying job action resulted in significant stressors for our school and system administrators to ensure a safe and productive experience for students.

### What are the biggest challenges you see for OCSOA and CASSA in 2016?

While there will always be challenges, experience has demonstrated that the opportunities for growth that are presented will strengthen our provincial and national associations. Collaboration and collegiality are outgrowths of the collective responses to challenges, and I'm confident that OCSOA and CASSA will continue to foster the relationships that benefit our supervisory officers and the school systems they serve.

#### What were the highlights of the 2015 conference?

The speakers and workshop presenters were top notch. Of course, the selection of OCSOA's EXL nominee, John Crocco, Director of Education for the Niagara Catholic District School Board, as the 2015 recipient of the national award was a major highlight.

# What would make CASSA an even stronger national voice for Canadian school system leaders in 2016?

CASSA should continue to encourage the sharing of successful practices through the annual conference. A winter Strategic Action planning session for the board of directors is critical to focus the efforts of the association and build the relationships that underpin the shared learning.
