

Fall Update:

Our New Name And New Website

all is here, and with it the start of a new school year. Especially for those working in education, that can often mean a time of renewal.

It's no different for our own organization. For many years, we've been known as the Canadian Association of School Administrators, or CASA. That's what it says right on the front page of this newsletter.

And that's changing.

You may have read executive director **Ken Bain**'s message about the name change in the last issue of *Leaders & Learners* (Volume 8, Issue 52) or on the CASA website

You may also have noticed changes to the former CASA website in recent weeks.

The board of directors unanimously approved a new name at the 2013 annual general meeting. We're now known as the Canadian Association of School System Administators, or CASSA. (En français: Association canadienne des gestionnaires de commissions scolaires/ACGCS.)

It was important to include the word "system" in the organization's name. This inclusion stems from discussions held at the board's last two strategic planning sessions, following a review of the communications audit recommendations a few years ago.

Identifying this organization's membership as "school system administrators" rather than "school administrators" is an important step in clarifying our focus and purpose.

As part of the organization's refresh, we've also launched a redesigned website, powered by Blackboard Engage.


